




Level of ARD Supervision as of December 31, 2011



Referrals by Month












Status of Offender to House Arrest (Total Supervised)



Shoplifter's Alternative Program








Total Juvenile Clients Monitored on House Arrest 2007-2011


Adult Positive Drug Screens 2011

Narrative

Johnny was a Machine Trades student at the Technical School and the school year had just begun when a substitute teacher was called in for the class. Johnny says he asked for help with his assigned project but the substitute teacher did not know how or was unwilling to help him. The student then proceeded to fashion what he claimed was a tool to split wood that could easily be described as a weapon or “shiv.”

The substitute teacher had no personal knowledge of the student, his machine trades ability, or his character. He was aware of the student’s activity but could not determine whether or not he was trying to carry out the assignment or intentionally creating a weapon. The teacher confronted the student at the conclusion of class when he attempted to take the “weapon” from the classroom with him.

The substitute teacher notified the Director of the Technical School who reported the incident to the local municipal Police. When the report reached the Intake officer at the Juvenile Probation office and the intake was completed, the case was determined to be both eligible and appropriate for Community Group Conferencing and the referral was made.

There was plenty of misunderstanding of the situation and many assumptions were made by the student, his parents, the substitute teacher and the school administration. All of

these parties participated in the conference, accurate information was exchanged and common ground for reparations was identified.

The student quite obviously had a difficult time speaking to and facing the group, because of his shy, self-conscious nature and his remorse. He hung his head and looked at his hands for much of the conference. When asked if there was anything more he would like the teacher or the administrator to know, Johnny haltingly spoke a simple apology looking up from his hands into the teacher's eyes as he did so. The teacher then thanked him for the sincere apology and explained that it was especially meaningful because Johnny had the courage to look him in the eye and admit his mistake.

Quotes from parents

“He is doing well, I told people when this happened that this is not my son and now people can see that it is not.”

“She is doing really well. Her school grades are up and she has more friends her own age. She is still seeing [the older girl she got into trouble with] but sometimes this girl's Dad and I keep up with what the two of them are doing now that we met at the conference.”
